DR. MELVIN A. KAHN

Mel Kahn had a long and impactful career, receiving many accolades. These include: the WSU Mortar Board Teaching Recognition Award (2012), the WSU Academy of Excellence Teaching Award (2007), the Carnegie Foundation Kansas

Professor of the Year (1989), Excellence in Teaching (1982) and the John M. Barrier Award for distinguished teaching in the humanities and social sciences. He was known for dressing up and portraying Alexander Hamilton, Plato and John Locke to bring history alive to his students. Kahn said "My real model is the quote from Aristotle, 'the mind is a re to be lit and not a vessel to be lled.' You want to stretch students' minds and inspire them to go out and see on their own." Serving in the 104th Infantry's Timberwolf Division, Partridge fought back the Wehrmacht o ensive during the Battle of the Bulge. For his e orts, he received the Bronze Star and Croix de Guerre. Following the war, Partridge obtai his Bachelor of Arts in political science from the University of Wichita. After graduating from Washburn Law School, he married Priscilla Barron. Partridge partnered with Foulston-Siefkin and performed numerous community functions while living in Wichita. Among other public involvement, the past president of the Wichita Bar Association served more than a decade as director, president member of the advisory board for the Wichita Area Girl Scouts Council where he was recipient of t highest volunteer award, the Ruth Robertson Award. In addition to serving their community, Rober and Priscilla felt strongly about education. Through the establishment of their scholarship, they've helped a number of students reach their academic goals.
